### Watercolor Demonstration by Pradeepa Thirumulu

April 5, 7:00pm at the La Canada Community Center, 4469 Chevy Chase Dr.



Pradeepa was born and brought up in Chennai, India. She graduated in electrical enginnering from Anna University India. She moved to the United States in 1998 and currently resides in Azusa.

After coming to the US Pradeepa developed a deeper interest in drawing and sketching. She is mostly self-taught but attended a few classes and workshops while bringing up her family. She is very versatile and works in many mediums including watercolor, oil, acrylic and pastel. However, watercolor really challenges her. She has been teaching watercolor for



more than 10 years at the Arcadia Community Center. She believes in continuous learning as she strongly feels one lifetime is not enough to learn the intricacies of art, especially watercolor.


#### Shaney Watters - Demo Review by Angela Alvarenga

Shaney Watters gave a beautiful demonstration on how she paints on wood panels. She says she is self-taught through trial and error. To start a painting, she selects a panel and sands it down. She then stains the panel and uses an adhesive to apply gold or silver leaf. The gold leaf is "composition gold

leaf," usually made with copper, zinc or brass. Once the gold leaf has been applied, she then does a sketch with a light burnt sienna.

Watters paints in oils because she likes to push the paint around. She applies her first layer using a photo reference of her subject. She starts with the actual color of the animal but then uses various colors to make it fun. She begins with a mid tone, and continues painting from darks to lights. She uses broad strokes and comes back in for the detail. She blends on the panel so the strokes look more like hair. Watters ends with the eyes

on the panel so the strokes look more like hair. Watters ends with the eyes because she feels like it is a payoff. She sometimes uses alcohol pads as an eraser to remove gold leaf and reveal the wood panel.





Watters is truly a master with her technique and wonderfully captures her love for all animals in every piece she creates. She often sells her pieces at Art Fairs and will bring work along to keep her occupied. She is also training to become a volunteer docent at a local zoo where she has picked up many fun facts on animals!





#### Artist of the Month by Angela Alvarenga



**Duane Stroh** won first place in the Open Category for Artist of the Month for his photograph, *Offshore Wind*. The photo was of a beautiful wave coming up onto the shore. Duane was inspired to take this photograph from years of surfing in Southern California since he was a teen. He has always loved watching waves and noticed the waves are the best when they are blown offshore. He received his first camera in high school and still takes a camera with him everywhere he goes. He loves to take photos when the surf is good, but also loves to be surfing when the surf is good.

Duane came into art through ceramics. He took his first pottery class in 1968 at a junior college. He has a home studio and is actively involved with the La Canada Flintridge Community Center where he can glaze his pottery and participate in craft fairs. Duane was especially honored to have one of his ceramics given to President Barrack Obama as an inauguration gift.
